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
2024 Budget Approved

The Final 2024 Sellersville Borough Budget was passed on Monday, December 11, 2023. The 2024 Budget reflects no increase in real estate, earned income, per capita, local services, or occupational assessment taxes for 2024. The Budget is balanced, fiscally responsible, and intended to fulfill the short-term and long-term goals of the Borough.

Real estate tax millage remains at 27 mills; 24 mills for General Purposes, and 3 mills in support of fire services in Sellersville Borough. There has not been a real estate millage increase since the 3 mills for Fire Service was instituted in 2020. Other taxes have stayed the same for decades.

There is a small increase in quarterly sewer rates, which haven't been increased since 2019. The minimum quarterly charge for 2024 is now \$60.00 for the first 300 cubic feet of usage (up from \$50.00); users will now pay \$4.60 per 100 cu.ft. up to 50,000 cu.ft over the initial 300 cu.ft. (up from \$4.25), and \$3.55 per cu.ft for usage over 50,000 cu.ft. (up from \$3.25). A portion of this increase will go toward capital improvements to the sanitary collection system.

As in prior years, a number of paving projects and stormwater management improvements have been budgeted, along with engineering work ahead of those projects.



Public Works Department

You may have noticed some changes to the Sellersville Borough Public Works Department. Long time employees John Barry (JB) Snyder retired after 58 years at the Borough and Jimmy Derstine retired after 43 years at the Borough. We thank them for their many years of dedication to the Borough.



Mike Zischang has been promoted to Public Works Superintendent and now oversees the Public Works Department. The Public Works Department maintains Borough streets, inlets, storm drains, Lake Lenape Park and the bicycle/walking path, Druckenmiller Playground, Borough equipment, vehicles, facilities, and buildings.

Assisting Mike are Conner Pfaff and Dave McCallister; both coming to the Borough with previous experience in water and sewer maintenance, as well as general public works. Conner lives locally with his wife and son. Dave lives in Quakertown with his son and dog. Both men are active members of the local Fire Departments.

If you see any of our Public Works crew on the street, say hello and introduce yourself. We like to hear from our residents.

The Fire House parking lot will transform into a showcase of over 130 spectacular cars, with trophies awarded by the Borough's distinguished figures. The Memorial Day Parade, which normally alternates with Perkasie, will be winding its way through the heart of Sellersville. The procession will feature an array of bands and fire companies, alongside various community organizations, all marching to the beat of patriotism and community pride.

As summer heats up, so does the town's patriotic fervor with the Annual National Bell Ringing ceremony at the Sellersville Museum. This event will resonate with the founding ideals of the nation, accompanied by the collective chime of the historic bell. Anticipation bubbles for the Community Picnic in August, where the potential chili cooking contest is already stirring up excitement. It's an opportunity for friends and family to convene and indulge in culinary delights, sharing stories and creating memories.

This Sesquicentennial year in Sellersville is not merely a reflection on its storied past; it is an embrace of the vibrant life that thrives within the Borough today and a look forward to its promising future. Each event is an invitation to witness the enduring spirit and camaraderie that are the hallmarks of Sellersville, a town where history is not just remembered but celebrated with communal joy and anticipation for the years ahead.

The "History Mystery" Column

In each issue of the Borough newsletter, we feature an historic photograph pulled from the Sellersville Museum's archive collection. We then give our readers clues and a chance to figure out what the "mystery" photo is.

The answer to the Fall/Winter 2023 issue's "mystery" is . . .

#35 Maple Avenue: the future home of Maple Lofts, a mixed-use commercial and upscale apartment complex.

This historic, 3-story brick edifice was constructed from 1892 to 1893 by the Otto Eisenlohr and Brothers Cigar Manufacturers. Based out of Philadelphia, the prominent cigar company (known for their "Cinco" and "Henrietta" brands) operated numerous factories throughout Pennsylvania during the height of the hand-rolled cigar industry of the 1800s and early 1900s.

Sellersville first welcomed Eisenlohr's in 1888 when they started renting a smaller structure at present-day #328 North Main Street. Within four years, the expanding company decided to erect this Maple Avenue factory. With business booming, they were again forced to construct an even larger brick building further west on Maple Avenue (previously located next to the Druckenmiller Playground) and relocated out of the building seen here in 1911.

That same year, the Item Publishing Company moved in and remained here until 1943, printing the weekly Sellersville Herald newspaper and the nationally-distributed magazine, The Poultry Item. Numerous other businesses occupied this





building afterwards, including Lemmon Pharmaceuticals, Penn Pants, and Dudley Sports Company baseball manufacturer). (a Beginning in the 1980's, Raymond C. Rumpf & Son (a popular fly-fishing equipment distributor) operated out of this old factory until recently moving to Lansdale. Occupancy in the newly-remodeled structure is anticipated later this year.




puns aren't helping, then re-read the above answer to last issue's puzzle. The name of this new mystery property is all over the "Place."]

Fire prevention is a year-round concern that does not

get a summer vacation. While on summer vacation there are various fire safety tips that should be kept in mind. When on vacation you are often not familiar with your surroundings and are in a different environment. While staying in a hotel, check to make sure that you know where the closest

stairwell is from your hotel room in the event of an emergency, as elevators will not be operational. Make sure that everyone in your group knows where to meet outside of the hotel in the event of an emergency. Knowing where the closest location to get medical attention, emergency and non-emergency, ahead of time can also save time and stress in a serious situation.

An AirBnB can be just like your home away from home and the same fire safety mindset should be kept while staying in an AirBnB. Once you arrive, check to make sure there are working smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors in the proper locations throughout the home. Familiarize yourself with the exits and make a plan of how to exit the house in the event of a fire. Just like at home, you should determine a safe meeting place outside of the house and make sure that everyone staying there knows where the spot is.

While enjoying the fun times of vacations and summer get aways, it's important to not forget about fire safety at home. Make sure that you have operational smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors in the correct locations throughout the house. Ensure that everyone knows where the safe meeting spot outside the house is and practice a fire drill exiting the home and meet at the safe meeting spot outside the house.

With the excitement of summer also comes outside fire hazards. Fireworks can add a fun and exciting extra to summer celebrations, but they must also be done safely to continue enjoying the summer. Children should never use fireworks and they should not be stored in a location that children might be able to have access to them.

Summer and cooking over a campfire go hand in hand, but that does not mean you do not need to be cautious while sitting around the campfire. Never leave the campfire unattended. Supervise children while around campfire and open flames. In Sellersville Borough, open burning is not permitted on public property, and on private property, all open flame burning must be 15 feet from buildings and always attended by a responsible adult. Open burning is never allowed under Red Flag warnings.

Sesquicentennial Celebration in 2024

"Happy Anniversary Sellersville!" That's right, as you may have already heard, 2024 marks the Borough's Sesquicentennial – the 150th Anniversary of its Incorporation as a Borough. In March of 1874, fifty-three residents, including four women, petitioned the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace of Bucks County "...for a Charter of Incorporation of the Village of Sellersville in said county." On December 7, 1874, that petition was granted. With the stroke of a quill pen, the village, which had once been known as The Village of Sellers Tavern, was incorporated and became the Borough of Sellersville.

Sellersville Borough Council has been working on a slate of events beginning in March with the annual Easter Egg Hunt. It is not too early to buy your tickets for the Community Banquet (April 13th) or to register your business or organization to march in the Memorial Day/Sesquicentennial Parade (May 25th). We expect it to be bigger than ever.

Other summer events include our Annual Bell Ringing on July 4th, an expanded Pennridge Community Day (July 7th) and a Community Picnic (Aug 17th). More activities and events will continue throughout the year, ending with a fireworks display to cap off this year's WinterFest celebration. So, start marking your calendar so you don't miss any of the fun. Stormwater Management



How Can I Be a Good Stormwater Neighbor?

Have you ever discussed stormwater with your neighbor or wondered how to be a better stormwater neighbor? Neighbor disputes over stormwater are very common. Water does not follow property boundaries and there are often instances where water flows from one property onto another and causes damage. It is important to realize that activities on your own property can adversely affect your neighbor's property. The first thing to do as a responsible neighbor is to familiarize yourself with how stormwater flows on your own property. Ask yourself how does water enter and exit my property? Are there areas of concentrated flow currently causing damage to your property or adjacent neighboring property? If so, flows can be redirected to vegetated areas for infiltration. You can also install a rain barrel, cistern, rain garden, or dry well as needed to control roof run-off.

When installing best management practices (or BMP's), do not direct stormwater flows onto a neighboring property and do not block stormwater from leaving your neighbor's property. Stabilize disturbed areas and maintain lawns, driveways, and gardens to prevent erosion and sedimentation on your own and on other peoples' properties. Changes from building and land development activities can alter natural flows of surface and stormwater. It is important to recognize that grading and re-grading can change how water moves across the land. It is essential to leave natural drainage paths undisturbed when possible and never intentionally concentrate stormwater flows. If you live near a stream, pond, or stormwater drain you can plant a riparian buffer or establish a "grow zone" along the waterbody to allow pollutants to be filtered before reaching the water. This will help prevent erosion on your property. Also, do not compost yard waste such as leaves, grass clippings, or mulch into or near a stream or stormwater drain. Clean up trash, litter, and other debris that may clog a drain or small stream that could potentially cause flooding or pollution from water run-off.

If you find yourself in a dispute with a neighboring property owner over stormwater issues remember: open communication and cooperation can prevent stormwater issues and help resolve existing stormwater problems. If you have questions about local stormwater regulations, contact your municipality. It is important to take steps to protect natural water courses, infiltration areas, and drainage paths. Be mindful of how your actions can affect adjacent landowners and take steps to prevent damage not only on your own property but also on your neighbor's property.


The countdown for the bell ringing commemorates the signing of the Declaration of Independence

Sellersville Borough Code Ordinance Chapter 55 Brush,Grass, Weeds



As spring approaches, we see sunshine again, buds growing on trees, flowers blooming, and yards turning green. While this is a sight for sore eyes after enduring a dreary winter, it becomes an eyesore when grass, bushes, and trees aren't maintained in the proper way.

The Sellersville Borough Code Ordinance Chapter 55 Brush, Grass, Weeds states:

"No person, firm or corporation owning any property within the Borough of Sellersville shall permit any grass or weeds or any vegetation whatsoever, not edible or planted for some useful or ornamental purpose, to grow or remain upon such premises so as to

exceed a height of 12 inches or to throw off any unpleasant or noxious odor or to conceal any filthy deposit or to create or produce pollen or to go to or produce seed. Any grass, weeds or other vegetation growing upon any premises in the Borough in violation of any of the provisions of this section is hereby declared to be a nuisance and detrimental to the health, safety, and cleanliness of the inhabitants of the Borough."

If you fail to comply with this ordinance, the Borough may remove, trim or cut the grass, weeds or vegetation, and the cost to do so, along with any additional penalty and legal fees authorized by the law, may be collected by the Borough. This often happens through a lien on your property.

Sellersville Borough Code Ordinance: Licensing and Inspection of Residential Rental Units in Sellersville Borough

All owners of property leased for residential occupancy must have their property inspected through the Sellersville Borough. The rental property must be inspected before it is rented to a new tenant or a minimum of every three years. Applications must be submitted to Sellersville Borough along with the Rental Property Inspection Fee of \$100.00 per unit. Forms and instructions can be found at https://sellersvilleboro.org/forms.html under "Residential Rental Dwelling Registration Form".



Did you know that when you make modifications around your property, there is a strong possibility that you need a permit from Sellersville Borough? Plumbing, mechanical, electrical, additions, demolitions, decks/patios, pools, roofing, fencing, or putting a shed on the property are some projects that require a permit, just to name a few. Ordinary non-structural repairs such as painting, new flooring, new kitchen and bathroom cabinets, or replacement of windows or doors where the existing opening in the structure is not altered do not require a permit. If you are altering, adding to, demolishing, or making a change to the occupancy of a structure, you need to apply for a permit. This includes converting



a garage into a room, moving walls, installing electrical outlets, adding new openings for windows or doors, or moving plumbing. Letters from Perkasie Police

BUS PATROL

The Perkasie Borough Police Department, which serves all of Sellersville and Perkasie Boroughs, is participating in the BusPatrol safety program to reduce the amount of school bus red light violations. The following article, which was posted on the Pennridge School District webpage, explains the program;

THE PENNRIDGE SCHOOL DISTRICT EMPOWERS THE "BUSPATROL" SYSTEM



Children who ride to school on Pennridge School Buses and their parents can expect a safer, smarter commute thanks to a new safety initiative. Last March, the Pennridge School District agreed to a six-year contract with the BusPatrol organization and local law enforcement to tackle the illegal passing of stopped school buses and utilize better tools for monitoring the safety inside our buses too. As part of the safety initiative, the entire fleet of 106 buses has been outfitted with automated enforcement technology to detect the license plates of vehicles that fail to stop for school buses, putting children at risk. The video evidence is shared with local law enforcement for review before a citation is issued. The Pennridge School District is

partnering with the Pennridge Regional, Hilltown Township, Dublin Borough, and Perkasie Borough Police Departments. The programs went live on October 1, 2023, and we invite our community motorists to familiarize themselves with the bus safety laws.

Incoming Pennridge School District Superintendent, Angelo Berrios asserted "I'm pleased to announce that our partnership with 'BusPatrol,' which we approved last March, will officially go into effect with the full support of law enforcement. This initiative underscores our unwavering commitment to the safety and security of our students during their daily commute. With 'Bus Patrol' in action, we are taking proactive measures to ensure the highest level of protection for our children." Last October, Pennsylvania authorities reported more than 250 stop-arm violations in one day during Operation Safe Stop. In 2020, the Allentown School District captured over 200 illegal passings on just two buses over a 47-day stop-arm study. This is equal to 2.18 violations per bus per day. A spokesperson for BusPatrol said that the safety initiative is proven to make roads safer: "Every day, thousands of cars ignore school bus stop-arms and speed past school buses as children are stepping on and off. Sadly, this dangerous motorist behavior is only getting worse. Our safety programs combine education and enforcement to change driver behavior and ensure that all motorists know when to stop for the big yellow bus. In some communities, our programs have reduced the rate of illegal passing by up to 30%." As stated by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, motorists must stop at least 10 feet away from school buses with red lights flashing and stop-arm extended. The penalty for a first-time violation is \$300.

OFFICER ROB EARLY RETIRES

The Police Department congratulates Officer Rob Early on his retirement from our agency which was effective on November 10, 2023. Officer Early served the residents of Perkasie and Sellersville Boroughs for over 23 years starting his career with Perkasie Police on June 5th of 2000. Officer Early spent his career in patrol and was a member of the Major Incident Response Team, Motor Unit and was a Department Firearms Instructor. Officer Early will be retiring from Perkasie Police to join the newly formed Perkiomen Valley School District Police Department. We wish Officer Early well in his new endeavors!

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Residential Waste and Recycling

Residential Waste

Sellersville residents are provided twice a week waste pickup once a week recyclables pickup on the second scheduled pickup of the week. Collection begins at 6:00 a.m. You may place your refuse at curbside no earlier than 6:00 p.m. the evening before your scheduled collection day.



Household waste containers should be between 20 and 35 gallons and may not exceed 50 pounds in

weight when loaded. Multiple containers may be placed out on pickup day. Use only sturdy plastic or metal containers with handles and detachable lids. Do not use cardboard boxes for trash containers, as they can become damp and fall apart at the curb.

Small amounts of construction debris from homes may be placed with household waste. Size and preparation limits still apply. Any wood should be bundled (less than 4 feet in length) with nails removed. For large renovations, building contractors should contact Republic Services for the removal of debris via commercial collections services at (610) 275-6767.

Broken glass hidden in a can is a constant danger to trash collectors. Glass windows or doors must be taped across all areas and on both sides. Please do not put glass or long metal items in plastic bags.

Unacceptable items: Household hazardous wastes such as gasoline, waste oil, non-latex paints, varnish, thinners, pesticides, drain cleaner, pool chemicals, bottled gas, car or truck parts and tires, batteries, or televisions. All paint containers must be completely dry with lids removed.

Curbside Recycling

Recycling is collected on the second scheduled pick-up day of the week only. Recyclables should be placed in a recycle bin or a container clearly marked "Recyclables". Do not use cardboard boxes for recyclables containers. They can become damp and fall apart at the curb. Materials and bundles should be tied securely and no longer than 4 feet. Bundles must be easily handled by one person.

Please rinse items before placing in the bin. Lids are acceptable for recycling.	

Bulk Items

Large items such as furniture, cabinets, washers, dryers, etc. are collected on the second scheduled pickup day of the week. A separate crew may collect these bulk items. There is a limit of one bulk item per week.

Unacceptable items: Refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, air conditioners or anything containing CFCs are collected by appointment only and a fee will be charged. Call (215)723-0400 to schedule.

Sharps Disposal

Needles from home medical use must be disposed of properly. Containers must be puncture proof. If a "SHARPS" container is not available, laundry detergent bottles work well. Information is available at medical providers or online at www.SafeNeedleDisposal.org

Holidays

If your normal trash collection day falls on a holiday, it will be picked up on the next scheduled collection day. Recycling will be picked up the next week.

Holidays include: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas Day.

Trash Service During the Holidays

Republic Services will be modifying their trash and recycling pickup schedule for the 2024 holidays.

Memorial Day, Monday, May 27, 2024:

If your normal trash pickup days are Monday and Thursday, your trash will be picked up on Tuesday, May 28 and trash/recycling picked up on Friday, May 31 If your normal trash pickup days are Tuesday and Friday, your trash will be picked up on Wednesday, May 29 and trash/ recycling picked up on Saturday, June 1.

July 4, 2024:

If your normal trash pickup day is on Thursdays, your trash/recycling will be picked up on Friday, July 5. If your normal trash pickup day is on Fridays, your trash/recycling will be picked up on Saturday, July 6.
